I Speak for Democracy

You all have the ability to speak, you all have the freedom to speak as you like, but do you have the courage to stand up and be counted when it comes time to speak for democracy.

Ours is the greatest Republic in the history of mankind. Our homeland was carved out of a vast wilderness by heroic men and women who were determined at any cost that their children, and their children's children, might live in freedom under God.

This year marks the twentieth anniversary of a tragic event in our history, - the attack on Pearl Harbor which triggered America's entry into World War II. That war cost the lives of 400,000 Americans - courageous men who at a time of gravest need speeding forward in the noble tradition of their forefathers to defend the cause of freedom and democracy with their lives.

But now two decades later in Europe, in Asia and in neighboring areas of the Western Hemisphere, we find stark evidence of a grim truth---that liberties once won must constantly be defended.

During our generations a new menace-international communism has arisen to threaten free men, throughout the world. Actually, there is little basic difference between the fascism of Adolf Hitler and the tyranny practiced behind the Iron Curtain. The Soviet Union and her satellites are a godless, undemocratic dictatorship ruled by warped and twisted minds.

Naturally we want to live in peace, but we do not want peace at any price,--we want peace with honor and integrity. And we intend to assure it for the future.

We have in our midst some timid souls who have so little faith in the strength of democracy that they would have our country yield to international threats and intimidation. I include those persons who urge, "peace at any price," and those who chant, the Better Red than Dead slogan.

America's emblem is the soaring eagle-not the blind and timid mole. Fear, apologies, and cowardice are alien to the thinking of true Americans. America does not have to apologize to anyone. Certainly not to the arrogant shoe-pounding Khrushchev and his puppets nor to those neutrals whose neutrality is but an evidence of moral weakness. We should keep our heads up looking for honorable solutions and selling America rather than keep our heads down looking for shelters and the compromise of human rights.

In the fight to preserve our Republic, it is not enough to be merely against crime, against subversion or against any other enemies which weaken the Nation's strength from within. To stand for the American ideal, to work for the cause of liberty and justice--these give true meaning to life, in this great Republic.

At another hour of grim challenge a full century ago, Abraham Lincoln urged the American people, Let us have faith that right makes might, and in that faith let us to the end dare to do our duty as we understand it.

We are living in an age of uncertainty--an age of awesome national peril. We now have need of faith as never before in our Nation's history. We must revive within ourselves the faith that our forefathers had in democracy which enabled them to meet and overcome adversity.

## The Cook Book

There were many noses sniffing the delicious aroma coming from room 30, May 2. Just what was this appetite-teasing smell? It was Salt Water Taffy. After sampling the candy, I would like to pass the recipe on to you.

The ingredients you will need are:

1 cup sugar  
1/2 tablespoon cornstarch  
2/3 cup light corn syrup  
1/2 cup water  
1 tablespoon butter  
1 tablespoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract

Blend sugar and cornstarch in a heavy, medium-sized pan. Add remaining ingredients except vanilla. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until sugar is completely dissolved. Avoid splashing on sides of pan above level of the mixture. Cover and boil gently 5 minutes. Uncover and boil, without stirring, to 245-246° F. Remove from heat, let stand until all bubbling ceases.

Pour into well-buttered marble or large heavy platter. When cool enough to handle, pull until firm and white, following directions for pulling taffy (B.S.L.O.). Draw out into a rope 1/2 to 3/4 inch thick. Cut with scissors into pieces about 1 1/2 inches long. Wrap each piece promptly in foil or moisture-proof paper.

### DIAGRAM NO. PULLING CANDY

Have ready a greased surface (baking sheet or platter) on which to lay the pulled candy.

Use butter, margarine, or cornstarch on hands while pulling candy, especially if it tends to stick to the hands.

Gather candy mass in both hands. Holding candy mass in left hand, grasp about half of the candy with the right hand; stretch it out about 12 inches. Still holding the end of the strand, bring the end back to the candy in the left hand. With right hand quickly pick up the end of the loop and return it to the left hand. Now all the candy is back in the left hand. As strands are pulled out, they may be twisted.

Repeat steps described above until the candy becomes lighter in color, becomes more elastic, and tends to spring back.

Pull candy into a long strand of desired thickness, cut into small pieces preferably with scissors.

One last word of advice. This is directed to the boys. Please stay out of the kitchen while the girls are trying to cook. They may add the measuring spoons to the mixture.

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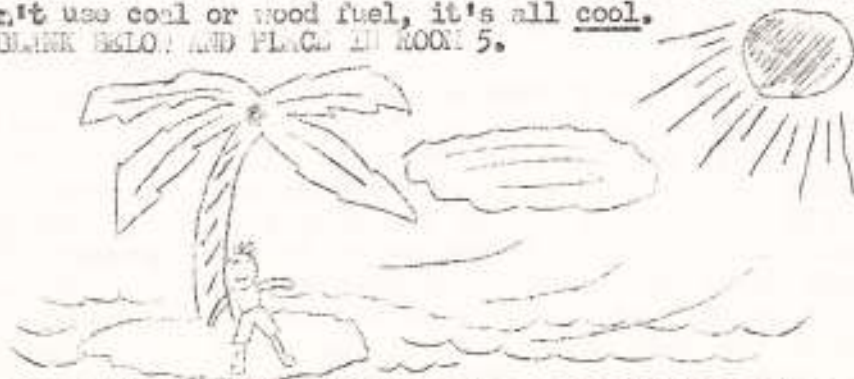
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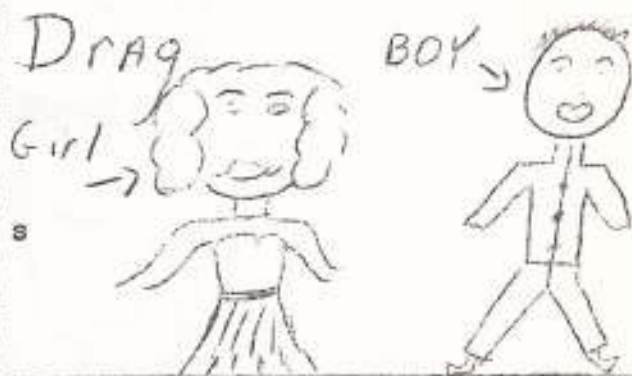
