Congratulations to the Hornets

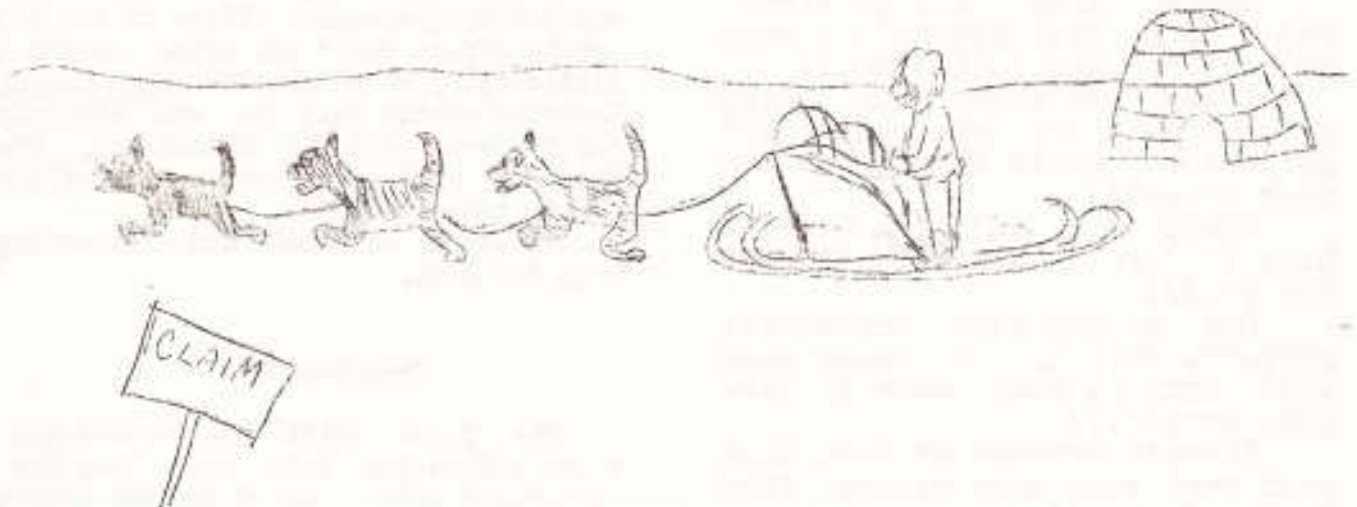

Blast From the Past

For you lovers of the sea, I have selected a mild mannered species of fish.

On a warm day in May, 1959, Abert Kogler and Shirley O'Neill, both eighteen and students at San Francisco State College, decided to cool off with a swim in the Pacific. Splashing into the surf at Bakers' Beach just outside San Francisco's Golden Gate, they swam seaward some 50 yards, Kogler in the lead. "I heard him scream", Miss O'Neill said later. "I turned around and saw this big gray thing flap into the air. There was a thrashing in the water. He screamed again. "It's a shark-get out of here.

Above the scene on the cliff-top grounds of the Presido, the United States Army post over looking Golden Gate, M?sgt. Leo P. Day watched the struggle with the shark. "I could see the boy in the foaming red water, shouting and signaling someone to to back, go back. Then I saw the girl, swimming toward him with frantic strokes, completely ignoring his warning."

Miss O'Neill reached for Kogler's hand. "But when I pulled I could see his arm was just hanging by a thread! So she put her arm about Kogler's back and started for shore. She dragged him close enough for a fisherman to throw a line and pull them the rest of the way.

His body half drained of blood, the boy died in two and a half hours later. For what Sgt. Day called "the greatest exhibition of courage I have ever seen", President Kennedy awarded Miss O'Neill the Young American Medal for Bravery, in 1961.

Despite their reputation for ferocity, sharks are indiscriminating scavengers. They will swallow anything; sea turtles, sea lions, birds, fish, lobsters, horseshoe crabs, garbage, coal, or people.

Sharks just bite and swallow, and apparently some can store food in their bellies for days or weeks

without digesting it, it was this outlandish ability, as shown by a captive shark, that led to the sensational affair celebrated in Australia as the Shark Arm Murder.

In 1935 a big Tiger Shark was caught and installed as a featured attraction at a Sydney aquarium. Eight days later the shark suddenly disgorged a human arm--so well preserved that medical examiners could make out an identifying tattoo on it. They could also see that the arm had been separated from its owner by a knife and not by shark's teeth. Following up these leads, the police traced the arm to an amateur boxer who had disappeared two weeks before. Police deduced that the boxer had been done in by ~~the~~ fellow conspirators when their scheme for wrecking a yacht to collect insurance had gone wrong. The suspected murderers evidently had managed to jam most of the body into a box and drop it overboard, but the arm would not fit in.

For a sailor on a Life Raft of a skin diver on a tropical reef, there is Shark Chaser, a shark repellent developed for the Navy in World War II.

Neither Shark Chaser nor anything else has proved effective when sharks go on a mass rampage known as a "feeding frenzy". This may occur when bait or entrails are dumped overboard from a fishing boat, attracting sharks in droves. Then the sea churns with fins and foam as the sharks, crazed by the blood in the water, slash at anything, often biting chunks out of each other. ~~Neither~~ ~~they~~ are helpless during a feeding frenzy. One of the worst mass shark attacks on records took place in 1942 when the troopship Nova Scotia was torpedoed at night off the coast of South Africa. A thousand men were lost, many of them presumably to the sharks. The next morning numerous legless bodies were found floating in the water.

For those of you lovers that like to take moonlight swims, Beware! For you may end up in the "happy hunting ground" before your time.
