June 5, 1965

President Ted Kennedy, commenting today on the Russian occupation and fortification of Long Island, the Panama Canal, and the southern tip of Florida, said: "We are watching these developments carefully and have sent a stiff note of protest to Moscow."

Congressman Caroline Kennedy (D, Mass.) and Richard King, son of Evangelist Martin Luther King, were married today. The ceremony was performed by Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, Frank Sinatra. A lavish reception followed at her home in Hyannis Port. Thirty-three of the guests were thrown into the swimmingpool, and all ended up in the hospital. It was later discovered that United Nations Ambassador Peter LaFord had drained the pool the night before as a practical joke. The happy couple will leave tomorrow on a six month honeymoon.

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Faculty Game

Monday afternoon (January 7, 1933) some of the teachers managed to get up a group of six or seven men for a faculty basketball game. The game was to be played at Surrattsville Junior High school at approximately 4:15 P.M. After it started Taney was the first to score. Through the first quarter neither team saw much heavy play for the game was very tight and rough. The score at the end of the first quarter stood at Taney 30, Surratts 29. In the second quarter the Taney faculty surprizingly pulled away to about an eight point lead (which soon vanished as Surratts put on quite an exhibition of offense and defense). Then at the end of the half, as in the first quarter, the score remained very tight at Taney 41, Surratts 40. As the end came to the short halftime intermission, play was resumed. After the tremendous play of the first half, you would never have thought that our "old men" could have come through like they did. Unfortunately the third quarter was a little short on the scoring line, Taney scoring only three points, and Surratts only four, to tie the game.

Then came the finale, when our men really gave it "the old college try." The lead snifted back and forth many times. With a minute and a half to go, the score stood at Surratts 50, Taney 49. Taney scored again and forged two points ahead. Then Surratts came back to tie the score at 51 to 51, with about fifty seconds left to play. In the closing seconds of the game, Mr. Whaley sank a foul shot and Taney went ahead by one point. This proved to be enough, as time ran out. The final score was Taney 52, Surrattsville 51.

The faculty could not have

won without their great teamwork. The high scorer of the game was Mr. Mann with sixteen points, and Mr. Blanford and his brother both at twelve points.

To Mr. Mudd, France's refusal to let Great Britain into the Common Market is a revenge against the British Commonwealth for her interference into the continent of Europe for the past four hundred years.

John F. Kennedy, Jr., announced today that he will be in the running for the Democratic nomination for Senator from Massachusetts. His campaign slogan will be: "I can do more for Massachusetts."

President Ted Kennedy said today that Jack, former President (1960-1968), will be out of retirement and be named Secretary of State, replacing Jacqueline, who will be given the post of Secretary of Defense.

Presidential Press Secretary, Mrs. Joseph P. Kennedy, mother the President, celebrated her 85th birthday today, and said that she has no thought of retiring. She also said that recent talk about a "Kennedy Dynasty" in Washington is just Republican propaganda and a lot of rubbish.

When questioned on the "Meet the Press" television program last night, Secretary of the Treasury, Bobby Kennedy said that he did not think the President's nine hundred billion dollar budget was too large. But he did say that the figure of three hundred fifty billion for foreign aid would be trimmed a trifle. "After all", he said, "there is such a thing as over doing it, you know." CONTINUED ON PAGE 5

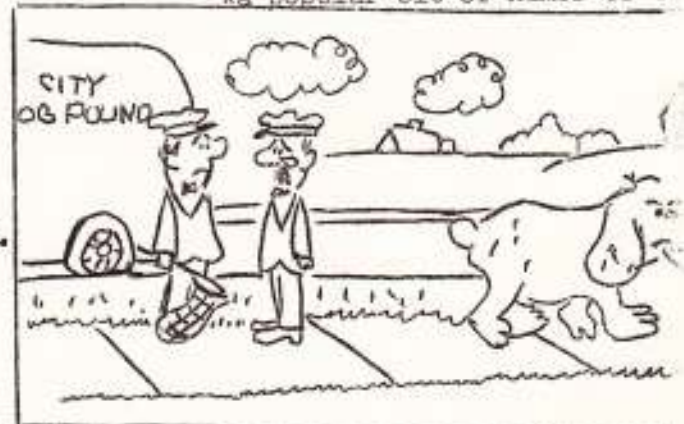
Secretary of Labor, Mike Quill, announced today his retirement and will be replaced by Teamster's Jimmy Hoffa.

President Ted Kennedy said yesterday that the wide increase in steel workers' wages from \$15. to \$17. per hour and the reduction in the work day to three hours was non-inflationary and does not call for a price increase by the Steel companies. When told that United States Steel closed at one and one-half on the New York Stock Exchange last night, he said that he thought the stock was over-priced. Asked about rumors his family was short \$50,000 shares since 1962, he said, "no comment."

Secretary of Agriculture Billie Sol Estes, who was appointed in 1963 by former President John F. Kennedy, Sr., announced his retirement.

Governor James Meredith, (Miss.), announced today that no caucasian student will be admitted to the State University until all Congolese applicants have been accepted.
